DATE/TIME OF DISTRIBUTION: June 16, 2023 3:00 p.m.

POTENTIAL RESPONSIBLE PARTY (PRP): Carlile Transportation Systems LLC

INCIDENT LOCATION: MP 142 Sterling Highway, 59.960260, -151.729828

DATE/TIME OF SPILL: July 27, 2021, at 8:00 a.m.

HOW/WHEN SPILL WAS DISCOVERED AND REPORTED: The Alaska State Troopers reported that this spill occurred when a tanker truck carrying 12,500 gallons of crude oil in two tanker trailers rolled over during a traffic accident on the Sterling Highway. One of the tankers was damaged, causing the release of product.

TYPE/AMOUNT OF PRODUCT SPILLED: The spilled product is Crude Oil. The tanker truck was transporting 12,500 gallons of Crude Oil. The amount of spilled Crude Oil is estimated to be 900 gallons.

CAUSE OF SPILL: A head on collision between the tanker truck and another vehicle.

SOURCE CONTROL: The source was controlled, and the remaining crude oil was removed from the damaged tank on July 27, 2021.

RESPONSE ACTION: The remaining crude oil was removed from the trailer on July 27, 2021. The impacted soils were excavated under the direction of a qualified environmental professional, and analytical sample results were received to confirm cleanup levels were met.

RESOURCES AT RISK OR AFFECTED: No impacts to wildlife resources were reported or observed. There are nearby wetlands, which support a number of birds (e.g. waterfowl, shorebirds, gulls and eagles) which may be present near the spill area. It is expected that there are moose and other fur-bearing mammals in the area. There have been no reports of impacts to wildlife. The Sterling Highway remains open, traffic control measures are being planned. It is likely that contamination extends beyond the Alaska Department of Transportation right of way, but at this time the area is heavily vegetated and the extent of contamination will be investigated.

FUTURE PLANS AND RECOMMENDATIONS: No additional actions required.

WEATHER: Currently, 55°F. Wind 11 mph, light rain.
