This letter is to inform you of the Defense Environmental Restoration Program - Formerly Used Defense Sites (DERP-FUDS) eligibility of your property, located on Whale Island, Alaska.

Whale Island was part of the Galankin Island Defense Site, which was established during World War II as part of the military defense of Fort Ray and the Naval Air Station at Sitka, Alaska. Improvements on Whale Island included two 90mm anti-motor torpedo boat (AMTB) gun emplacements, a powerhouse, mess hall, barracks, a storehouse, and a fuel tank.

Enclosed is a "Findings and Determination of Eligibility" (FDE) signed by Brigadier General Pat M. Stevens IV on April 4, 1989. The FDE indicates that although Whale Island is an eligible DERP-FUDS property, there are no projects eligible for environmental restoration.

Alaska District Corps of Engineers personnel conducted a preliminary assessment of Whale Island on July 23, 1998. All of the major facilities and suspected areas of contamination on the island were located and inspected. Chemical analysis results from a soil sample taken at the location of the former fuel tank indicated that no significant contamination exists. The debris remaining on Whale Island does not meet the criteria of "unsafe" as defined by FUDS guidance, and is therefore not eligible for DERP-FUDS restoration. Debris located on private property is also excluded from FUDS restoration.

Based on the results of the 1998 site inspection, the preliminary assessment team concurs with the original 1989 Findings and Determination of Eligibility. Therefore, no further FUDS action is anticipated for Whale Island.

## FINDINGS OF FACT

#### 1. PROJECT IDENTIFICATION

Galankin Island Defense Site, consisting of several islands and containing 140 acres, is located 1 mile South of Sitka, Alaska.

## 2. ACQUISITION

Galankin Island Defense Site was obtained for the War Department by implied transfer from the Department of the Interior. Date of entry was 26 January 1943.

## UTILIZATION

This site was used by the U.S. Army as part of the military defense of the Naval Air Station and Fort Ray at Sitka, with proposed installation of gun batteries, searchlights, listening posts, and other harbor defenses. Extensive improvements were constructed on Kayak Island and Whale Island, including barracks, storage sheds, water towers, power plants, and lookout posts.

#### 4. DISPOSAL

Galankin Island Defense Site, containing 140 acres, was declared excess by the Army and was disposed of as follows: 96 acres were transferred to the Department of the Interior on 2 August 1944; 44 acres were transferred to the Department of the Interior, Bureau of Land Management (BLM), which accepted accountability effective 7 August 1946. This site is within the boundary of the Tongass national forest, under the jurisdiction of the U.S. Forest Service, subject to patents issued for portions to the State of Alaska, Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

#### EVALUATION

The A/E contractor through correspondence with the State of Alaska, DNR, David and Georgia Shaw Holden, Howard Pendell and Pat Kehoe-Pendell, Matthew I. and Donna H. Donohoe, Jeffrey Longridge, Michael A. and Susan J. Litman, Kitty Labounty, Nina C. Piper, Cory Samia, James W. Steffen and Vern Culp, D. Gle and Myrna S. Wade, Galankin Islanders, Inc., Larry T. Edwards, John a. Wetteland, J.W. and

Louise T. Davis, John W. Williams, Judith Lugdon (Lowcock Estate) could find no evidence of hazardous/toxic waste, ordnance or unsafe debris.

# DETERMINATION

Based on the foregoing Finding of Fact, the site has been determined to contain no hazardous/toxic waste, no ordnance and no unsafe debris. Therefore, I have determined that an environmental restoration project is not within the purview of the Defense Environmental Restoration Program (10 USC 2701, et seq.).
