- Worksheet Purpose
 - Provide EPA with specific and adequate information to determine property eligibility under the Brownfields Program
- Why the worksheet is important
 - If property is not eligible then no brownfields funding can be used at, for, or on the property
 - TRP cooperative agreements are funded with brownfields money
- Make sure to provide complete and accurate information
- EPA Project Officers are available to assist and provide guidance

- When to complete worksheet
 - Prior to spending an increased amount of response program funding on a specific brownfields site
- Property needs to meet definition of a brownfields
 - Defined as "real property, <u>the expansion, redevelopment, or reuse</u> of which may be complicated by the presence or potential presence of a hazardous substance, pollutant, or contaminant."
- Why does brownfields definition matter?
 - Funding and eligibility depends on meeting the definition

- Site specific activities that require eligibility determination
 - Extensive research on a specific property
 - Environmental Site Assessments
 - Developing Sampling and Quality Assurance Plans
 - Conducting Sampling
 - Cleanup Planning
 - Cleanup
 - Unsure? Ask your Project Officer
- Applies to activities either conducted in-house or work completed by consultant

- Worksheet Sections
 - Basic Site Information
 - Property name, location, current owner, type of contamination, intended reuse
 - General Eligibility
 - Property is not a class of sites automatically excluded from Brownfields funding
 - Hazardous Substances & Commingled Sites
 - Affirming no liability rests with grantee
 - Petroleum Sites
 - There is no viable responsible party
 - Site Eligibility Determination
 - Eligibility determination decision by grantee and EPA
